PRESIDENT'S CORNER



**Tomorrow's joy is possible

This club meeting finds us commemorating September as the New Generations Month in the Rotary calendar. With PDG Jesse Chua providing the nuts and bolts as our Guest of Honor and Speaker today, we are starting off well with Rotary Information as we begin our work this month.

Here are some excerpts from Rotary concerning what we should be looking at in developing our youth.

There are three basic ways we try and get involved as a Rotary Club with our "new generations" or youth groups as we sometimes call them.

"Interact, is a Rotary-sponsored service club for young people ages 14-18. The program gives young people an opportunity to participate in fun, meaningful service projects while developing leadership skills and meeting new friends. Through service activities, Interactors learn the importance of: (1) developing leadership skills and personal integrity; (2) demonstrating helpfulness and respect for others; and (3) advancing international understanding and goodwill.

Rotaract, is a Rotary-sponsored service club for young men and women ages 18 to 30. Rotaract clubs are usually community-based or university-based and are sponsored by a local Rotary club making them true "partners in service" and key members of the Rotary family. Through the Rotaract program, young adults not only augment their knowledge and skills, but they also address the physical and social needs of their communities while promoting international understanding and peace through a framework of friendship and service.

The most powerful force in the promotion of international understanding and peace is exposure to different cultures. The world becomes a smaller, friendlier place when we learn that all people—regardless of nationality—desire the same basic things: a safe, comfortable environment that allows for a rich and satisfying life for our children and ourselves. Youth Exchange provides thousands of young people with the opportunity to meet people from other lands and to experience their cultures. This plants the seeds for a lifetime of international understanding."

At our own Club level this year, RC Baguio has one Rotaract Club already organized (the Rotaract Club of SLU-Medicine) and two more are in the works—dentistry students at the University of Baguio and medicine students from the Baguio Central University. VP Flo is working on our Interactors to be inducted this month as well. We are still looking for any interested club members who would like to take advantage of the Rotary Youth Exchange programs that are available.

This year, we are challenging our various new generations groups to do more than the "normal projects" they undertake with the Club each year. Each group has a copy of the criteria and awards that Rotary International has both Interact and Rotaract and we hope that they will at least try for the awards. Further, we will be taking the some of the officers to Luding, and will then also challenge them to try and accomplish something significant to enhance our yearlong Luding Project.

Other items of note over the past week: (1) there has been an initial meeting with Dr. Manny Factora of the Baguio General Hospital concerning our Rotary Marker there. Dr. Factora is keen to see what we can do together to enhance our marker near the BGH Circle; (2) we have closed some of the small bank accounts in various banks, as a part of the Board's decision to consolidate the more than 20 bank accounts we had at the beginning of the term; and for the Finest Moments... (3) PP Veeh, PP Linda and VP Flo are back from Taiwan, where they attended the Asian Pacific Regional Rotaract Conference 2005 (hopefully one of them will do a write-up to share with the Club).

GUEST OF HONOR AND SPEAKER'S PROFILE

PDG JESUS "JESSE" CANO CHUA

Born on 09 April 1944 in Tarlac, Tarlac, our guest speaker is second to the eldest among the nine children of Benito Chua Sr., and Lourdes Estrada Cano both deceased. He is married to the former Josefina Go, a Certified Public Accountant from Dagupan City with whom he has three (3) children – Jobel, 35 years old, a Chemical Engineer and a Master's Degree holder in Business Management from the Asian Institute of Management; Jasmin 34 years old, Entrepreneur and a Certified Public Accountant, and Jesus Jr., 30 years old, a Civil Engineer with an MS Degree from the Stanford University and an MBA from Harvard University, both in USA.

From a humble beginning, he graduated First Honorable Mention from Zaragosa Elementary School in Nueva Ecija, then as high school Valedictorian from the Bayanihan Institute in Tarlac, Tarlac after which he worked his way through college and earned a Bachelor of Science in Commerce degree from the Far Eastern University.

After graduation from college, he went home to Tarlac, Tarlac and started a small gasoline station business. Within a span of less than 30 years he was able to expand it into a conglomerate of allied business which includes construction firms, real estates, agriculture, food manufacturing, trading, banking and supermarkets.

While attending to his diversified businesses, his involvement in the community was not left unattended as he occupied the helm of leadership at one time or the other in the Tarlac Jaycee Senate, United Way of Tarlac, Isagani Lodge No. 96, F & AM, Tarlac Volunteer Fire Brigade, Knights of Rizal, Philippine National Red Cross-Tarlac Chap-

ter, Federation of Filipino Chinese Chamber of Commerce and other non-government organizations.

In 1980, he was inducted as Charter Member of the RC Midtown Tarlac. He soon became its President for RY 1986-1987 and became a Paul Harris Fellow and a major gift donor. Among his contributions to his club were the organization of the RCMT Foundation, Inc., Sisterhood Pact with RC Urdaneta and RC Hartwell, Georgia USA, Rotary Village Corps of Barangay Aguso and Barangay San Rafael.

He was appointed to various position in RID-3790 notable among which were his having served as its League President for RY 1986-1987, DGGR of all Rotary Clubs in Tarlac RY 1987-1988. Chairman District Assembly May 1988, and a member of D.G. nominating committee RY 1989-1990.

In 21 November 1992 he was chosen as DGN to serve as District Governor of RID-3790 for RY 1994-1995. He was the Chairman of the District Nominating Committee and Chairman of the Rotary Foundation of District 3790 in 1996-1997. He was the chairman, Council of Past District Governors, D-3790 in RY 1997-1998, Chairman on Matching Grants and Permanent Funds in RY 1998-1999. He served in various capacities as presentation speaker, moderator and rapporteur in Asian Zone institutes in Bali, Indonesia, Bangkok, Thailand, Cebu, Manila and Taipei, Taiwan. Appointed as RI Pres. Representative to RID-9460, Western Australia in 1998 and to RI D-3850 Philippines in 2001. He was appointed member of the Committee on Credentials at the RI Convention in Singapore 1999. His latest appointment was as RI Zone 7 (Australia & Philippines) Coordinator on Task Force Literacy 2000-2001.

The Raffle conducted by the Anns made them richer by P3,250.00. They raffled-off 42 prizes consisting of potted plants and assorted household items. Many were happy to have won more than two or three prizes. Right before Members' Time, Dir. Raffy Chan conducted his second "Toast of Fellowship" salute. This time in honor of the Rotary Club of Cannes-Le Canet. Mabuhay!

At the President's time, Pres. Mike asked the Sunshine Committee and the RCB members to visit Andre Sommereux at the SLU hospital where he is recuperating. He thanked Gerard Audineau for his efforts in finding the blood needed by Andre, who lost so much of it during his illness. The type "O negative" is not readily available in our country; not as prevalent as it might be in Europe. Pres. Mike also thanked Dr. Joey Bugayong who "saved" the life of Andre which turned out to be in danger at that time. Next was Pres. Mike's official announcement that PP Lito was the new Sergeant-At-Arms. PP Lito accepted it like a good soldier he is. Another president, Pres. Maya of the Anns, announced their club's 50th anniversary celebration to be held on October 2005 and she asked for our club's wholehearted support.

PP Lito Pangilinan introduced our guest speaker, PDG Alvin Gonzales, who incidentally was his governor during his term as president of our RCB. PDG Alvin mentioned that he feels comfortable being in our club because he considers RCB as his second club. He even mentioned that when he retires in Baguio, he will surely decide to join our club. He also said that he owes our club a sense of gratitude because it was here in Baguio when he won his election as governor-nominee; that our club sponsored him in 1997. PDG Alvin spoke lengthily on the subject of Membership and Retention, which is RI's theme for the month of August. He spoke about the Rotary being magical, that the greatest asset of the Rotary is membership; for without it, Rotary would simply cease to exist. Another important factor, he said, is membership retention. He mentioned the sad fact that Rotary membership worldwide is declining instead of increasing annually. Whatever gains made by the recruitment efforts by the Rotary clubs is negated (simultaneously) by the big number of drop-outs. He mentioned apathy, status-quo and exclusivity, as a hindrance in the recruitment of young, new members.

It was a first in our club that the guest of honor and speaker was asked to give the usual ice cream treat; PDG Alvin gave it heartily. After PP Alfred Laygo his usual boisterous and humorous response and the singing of the "Pilipinas Kong Mahal", Pres. Mike adjourned the meeting at 2:30 P.M.



SHARING THE GIFT OF ROTARY

Take a moment and think about how you were introduced to Rotary. Who invited you to your first Rotary meeting? Who invited you to join your club? Now think about all of the great people you've met, important projects you've contributed to, interesting places you've been, and the people you've helped throughout your time in Rotary.

It's probably fair to say that, considering all you've gained through your membership in Rotary, you appreciate the person who first invited you to your club. If it hadn't been for that person's kind invitation, you might not have had the same opportunities for fellowship, service, and international exposure.

For many people, joining Rotary is a life-changing event. So why do so many Rotarians find it difficult to ask others to join?

Perhaps members are uncomfortable approaching other people and "selling" Rotary to them. Maybe they don't know how to explain Rotary to others in a concise and appealing way.

Regardless of the reason for their hesitation, a change in perspective may motivate more Rotarians to invite others to come to a Rotary event with them. Perhaps if members focus on all of the benefits of Rotary and think of Rotary membership as a gift to be shared instead of product to be sold, they will be more inspired to invite others to join Rotary.

Because August is Membership and Extension Month, now is the time to challenge your club members to invite someone into Rotary. After all, the fact that membership in Rotary is by invitation only means that the survival of your club depends on members sharing Rotary with others.

The following program outline is a sample of how you can approach the topic of recruitment in an upcoming club meeting. Following these steps can help members view recruitment as sharing Rotary instead of selling Rotary and equip them with tools to address their recruitment apprehensions.

First, spend a few minutes facilitating a discussion among club members in which they reflect on the person who proposed each of them for membership. Ask them to consider how much their time in Rotary has meant to them and how much they have gained from Rotary. Suggest that Rotary membership is a gift, and emphasize how important it is to share this gift with others. You may want to point out that someone was once nice enough to share Rotary with each one of them, and so they should all extend the courtesy and share Rotary with others. Once members are focused on how much they have enjoyed and gained from their time in Rotary and how appreciative they are of the person who proposed them, they may be more open to the idea of sharing the gift of Rotary with others in their lives.

The next step is for each club member to come up with a list of qualified individuals who might make a good Rotarian: friends, family members, business associates, neighbors, and other acquaintances. Some members may say that they can't think of any good prospective members. To address this issue, hand out index cards and ask your members to use the card to keep a list of every person they meet or speak to in a 24-hour period – surely one of those people is worthy of the gift of Rotary!

At this point, it's important to discuss how club members should approach these potential Rotarians. It can be intimidating for both the Rotarian and the prospective member if the Rotarian tries to "sell" Rotary and explain everything about its programs in the initial invitation. Therefore, it can be beneficial to keep the initial contact as simple as possible. Remind your members that the initial approach can be very effortless; in many cases, it's simply inviting someone to breakfast or lunch or saying something like, "I'm going to a meeting later this week with a program that I think you'd find interesting. Would you like to join me?"

Finally, spend a few minutes having your club members write down some of the reasons they're in Rotary. Encourage them to discuss these reasons with the next guest they bring to a club event. Sharing the gift of Rotary is more than just inviting someone to a meeting; it also includes sharing personal Rotary experiences with the people around you. When prospective members hear about the great experiences that their hosts have had in Rotary, they can start to visualize the great experiences they might have in Rotary.

At the end of your program, remind club members that inviting someone to a Rotary event opens up a whole world of exciting new opportunities for that person. Encourage them to share the gift of Rotary with the people around them. Once club members think about recruitment as sharing a gift instead of making a sales call, you should see an increase in the number of prospective members invited to club events.

Be sure to follow up with your members throughout the year so that recruitment becomes a continuous activity in your club and so that every member is held accountable for their recruitment activities. As club members learn to discuss their own personal experiences and the benefits of Rotary with prospective members, they'll soon discover that inviting individuals and sharing Rotary is easier than they thought it would be.

ROTARY BEYOND THE CLUB

Some new members join Rotary with an immediate sense of loyalty and dedication, while others acquire this devotion gradually. For many Rotarians, their commitment grows by experiencing Rotary beyond their own club, through an inspiring event or international project. Once your members have experienced Rotary beyond your club by participating in such events or projects, they are more likely to be inspired and feel invested in Rotary. And this increased level of personal investment can lead to greater retention in your club.

Because June is the month of Rotary's international convention, now is the time to think about how you can emphasize participation in Rotary beyond your club and beyond your country.

Attending district meetings and events is a great opportunity to get members involved in activities beyond your club. At district meetings, like the district Rotary Foundation seminar or district membership seminar, members can learn about district issues and meet Rotarians from other clubs. The district leadership seminar also offers an excellent opportunity for members to learn about the various district activities in which they can participate.

At international events, like the RI Convention, Rotarians from around the world have the opportunity to meet one another and learn about the international projects that other clubs and districts conduct. Attending international events can help members gain a global perspective on Rotary and spark ideas for international projects that their own club or district can conduct.

Participating in RI programs is another way to get members involved beyond your club. Through Rotary Fellowships, club members can meet other Rotarians from around their district — and the world — who share their interests and hobbies. The Rotary Volunteers program connects members with service projects outside of your club that need their vocational expertise. Your club could also get involved with a local Group Study Exchange (GSE) team that will be going abroad or a foreign GSE team visiting your area. Still another international program is Rotary Friendship Exchange, where members experience another culture by staying in the homes of Rotarians in other countries.

Although the club is the most important element of Rotary, the organization's district activities and vast international community also offer many exciting opportunities. Exploring Rotary's internationality and encouraging members to participate in Rotary beyond the club level can help both new and existing members feel more connected to the worldwide community of Rotarians, which in turn can lead to greater member retention in your club.
