Welcome to our first Family Day for the current Rotary Year (2007-08). Special welcome to our esteemed and beautiful Rotary Anns who are joining us today. Many still prefer to call these special month-end meetings as Ladies' Day; your president remains one of those.

As we continue to reconcile with our strengths as a club, it is befitting to likewise constantly resolve that one of our main fountainhead of strength streams from our Rotary Anns Club of RCB. Not only because they often help us with the work at hand, but because they continue to inspire (both individually and as a group) our Rotarian members. My belief is that without them, our club strength would be much compromised.

The PowerPoint presentation of PDG Alvin Gonzales (District Trainer), who has graciously given the same to the undersigned and consented to my sharing it among fellow-Rotarians and friends, has been sent by the undersigned to all Rotarians with an active Internet e-mail address. Said presentation is profuse in content and very authoritative. Thanks and kudos to PDG Alvin!

Allow me to re-emphasize one of the most critical matter relative to the presentation. It is the item on the Call to Order—for the Program Coordinator NOT to “command” nor even request the president to call the meeting to order. The recommended dialog should be: “Mr. President, we are ready...”.

Your president is pleased to confirm some progress relative to our “dream” to bring electricity to our adapted community Luding. GM Gerry Versoza has graciously endorsed our Electrification Request Letter (in behalf of the Luding residents) to the BENECO Engineering Department for site investigation and estimate.

Earlier, we toyed with the idea of using wind power to give the Luding residents some token electricity. Only after discussion with some Rotarians did it occur to us that using the wind might not yield enough power for the use of many. Not to mention the expense that would be incurred to generate enough wattage for the use of most residents. My final hope is that when the BENECO estimate figure comes in, that I would not fall off my seat! For the sake of our beneficiaries, I trust that the figure will be something we can work with.

Allow me to share the following RCB Membership Statistics, as of 30 June 07—as the term of IPP Gerard ended. Number of members: 41; number of male members: 32; number of female members: 9; average age of members: 56; number of Rotarians who have been members for 1-3 years: 7, 3-5 years: 3, 5-10 years: 8. Number of members who have proposed a member in the previous two years: 8. Club membership is one of our major thrusts for this Rotary year.

Our Latin motto for this week—“*E pluribus unum.*” Literally means: From many, one. This is the motto of the USA. Not unlike our American brothers and sisters, we Rotarians constantly reconcile with other club members who come from different professions, age, gender and ethnicity. THE CAÑO A Celebration of Service

Our Official Club Bulletin has been called The Caño. “Caño” (*pronounced as kan-yau*) is actually the local term for the dance during native feasts or celebrations in the highlands of the Cordilleras- in Northern Luzon of the Philippines.

This is depicted in our Caño emblem (above) which shows a number of human figures in deep concentration—absorbed in ritual dance.

The attention, focus, commitment and unity of the club’s members is represented by the dancing figures—in celebration or expectation of a bountiful harvest; much as we actually do— in anticipation of the joy derived from public service to the community—always coupled with fellowship. Hence, the sub-title of “A Celebration of Service.”

The Rotary Club of Baguio (RCB) was chartered on 21 February 1938. The 4,587th member of Rotary International and the oldest club organized North of Manila; the 6th chartered Rotary Club in the entire Philippines.

Our over-simplified club logo (red) is a composite of the letters r, c & B; this is symbolic of the club’s straightforwardness. Over-all cardioid-heart shape connotes that our members serve from the heart. The four basic elements (four quadrants— now 3D bevelled) are symbolic of Rotary’s Four-Way Test and the members’ commitment to it. Our charter year of 1938 is used as the mid-focal point of the logo, to emphasize our early beginnings and continuing dedication to *Service Above Self*.



Why Remain A Rotarian

I have been asked by our new President Raffy for a short article on why I choose to remain a member of Rotary. When I joined the club over forty years ago, we had only two Rotary districts in the entire Philippines and we had the honor of having two Past District Governors in our club—PDG Dr. Nanding Manalo and PDG Tata “Sir” Ikong Reyes. To be a Rotarian was a real privilege back then, and still is to this day. We met at the old Pines Hotel around noon for a short social time before starting our meetings at exactly 12:30! If the President didn’t ring the bell on time, you would see Tata Ikong or one of the other past officers go over to remind him. We also finished right at 2:00, as many of our members had to return to work. The mining people were required to work six days a week and most of our others members returned to their places of work or to their profession Saturday afternoons. If our speaker was really interesting, we might extend the meeting for a short time but the President would notify the members and tell those that would like to leave, that they could do so at that time. We had a lot of fun during the Finest Moments where Tata Pinong Bueno would bring clippings from the Midland Courier of any of the Rotarians who had their picture or were mentioned for whatever reason and were fined for this honor.

We attended many of the District functions together with our Anns. I especially remember flying to Naga City during my term as President in 1972 with a large group and in 1975 when we had over ten couples fly to Cebu for a joint conference; and we brought the house down with our Igorot dance while attired in appropriate G-strings and beating the ganzas. It seemed one of our members was having difficulty keeping his G-String from falling down! In 1978, I was asked to be the main speaker at a Rotary conference held at the Manila Hotel and spoke on Membership Development in front of over 600 Rotarians. I still have the beautiful Rotary wheel plaque displayed above my bar; of which I am particularly proud.

I was able to maintain 100% attendance for the first ten years of my membership, even though I made up in over 12 countries while flying around the world with my family in 1968 and again in 1974. I also always made up during our trips back to my home in the States. Unfortunately I started having medical problems and underwent my first heart quadruple bypass in 1983. This was a “walk in the park” compared to my second one in the year 2000. During this one, I had another quadruple bypass plus a main valve replaced in my aorta. I also had an endarterectomy which ended my singing career. It seems after they cleaned my carotid artery, it formed an aneurysm which burst just as I was waking up from the operation. This caused the doctors to put in many more stitches and gave me a stiff neck. I said that I should sue the doctor, like Julie Andrews did; but someone said “You couldn’t sing in the first place.” I sure miss being able to sing with the Jack/Al duet and all the Tagalog songs that I love. Of course with a few beers or a little wine, I can still hit some notes.

I also remember when the topic of admitting ladies into the club was discussed. It was my view that we older members had already had our time and that if the newer Rotarians wanted to accept the ladies, then it was alright with me. It sure proved them right, as we have had two—PP Veeh and PPLinda, as very successful presidents and many more promising ladies in the club now to help lead in the future.

I can’t close without giving due recognition to all the doctors and others who have contributed to the success of our various programs and projects which has made our club so outstanding and which also makes me proud to still be a member of the Rotary Club of Baguio. I look forward to a great year under the stewardship of Raffy and all the other knowledgeable members. Don’t forget us old Rotarians and I hope to be able to attend many more of our meetings in the future. Mabuhay to all!

WHY LATIN?

President's Article

Over the past weeks, your president has been asked many a time: “Why Latin?” Many among our Rotarians remain rather intrigued why they need to contend with Latin quotes and sayings; when I could just directly quote the English meanings—never even having to reconcile with a single word of Latin.

This will be my attempt to explain and justify my option of having Latin (all over) this Rotary Year: as club motto and as a weekly title for my President's Corner. I write the following in the hope to convince you that my reasons are valid and likewise good in “challenging your mind.”

In the first place, you already know several words of Latin! Many “English” words are actually Latin. Some examples: *alibi* (elsewhere), *agenda* (things to be done), *alias* (otherwise), *per se* (by or in itself), *per capita* (per head), *per diem* (per day), *ergo* (therefore), *pro rata* (in proportion to the value)—all of these are Latin word/s which you already know and use, in all their freshness, without the benefit of any translation. Did you know that at least 60% of words in the English language are derived from Latin? Get any English dictionary, examine the etymology of words, and appreciate the sheer number of words that have Latin root words or derivations. Most, if not all, of the 206 bones in your body are Latin; our Rotarian doctors will confirm this. Our lawyers also have Latin (as a staple source of words) in their legal vocabulary which confirms that the influence of Roman Law is still alive in the words they use (if not also in the essence of the thinking that pervades their field).

Likewise, many of the common abbreviations you use are actually Latin. Just to name a few: A.D. is actually *Anno Domini* (in the year of the Lord); etc. is actually *et cetera* (and the rest), e.g. is *exempli gratia* (for the sake of example); m.o. actually mean *modus operandi* (way of operating); op. cit., usually used in literary work means *opera citato* (in the work just quoted); n.b. is *nota bene* (note well or observe carefully)... I can go on and on...

Many organizational, state, and country mottos are in Latin. Just to name a few: *A mari usque ad mare* (From sea to sea)- motto of Canada; *Ad lucem* (Towards the light)- motto of the University of Lisbon; *A pluribus unum* (From many, one)- motto of the USA; *Esse quam videri* (To be, rather than to seem)- state motto of North Carolina; *Semper fidelis* (Always faithful)- motto of US Marine Corps; *Semper Paratus* (Always prepared)- motto of US Coast Guards; and *Sapientia aedificat* (Wisdom builds)- motto of Saint Louis University (SLU), in Baguio. Latin has that certain “snub appeal” when used in a motto; hence, its widespread use.

During our days at SLU Boys' High School (some forty years ago), we were the “chosen ones” who were the last of the Classical Section. We studied Latin for four long years—as a special subject added to our regular high school curriculum; the reason why I share this love and appreciation for this “dead” but special language. As explained to its students by its teachers, Latin: (1) Teaches English vocabulary like no other language; (2) Prepares students for the study of modern languages; (3) Teaches grammar far more effectively than any English curriculum; (4) Trains students in valuable habits of mind: memory, order, attention to detail; (5) Provides us with a lifetime worth of reading; (6) Is quite simply beautiful. Even if you disregard the first four, and just settle for the last two items/reasons, you would already have good motivation to be interested in Latin—as we continue to enjoy our quotes again and again throughout life, for their wisdom, being undimmed by age—theirs, or ours. At its best, Latin is a model of an ordered, polished, and balanced language. It is a pleasure to read, to write, and even to recite.

Maybe my view is biased, but do indulge me and my Latin, and enjoy learning a little of the language in the process. My hope is that you will eventually like it...

Even if you do not fully agree with my brief explanation, you will definitely have to agree with the third and fourth paragraphs of this article (at the very least). Thence, in the final analysis, whether you like Latin or not, you cannot escape from it. It is something that is here to stay. You can run, but you cannot hide from Latin. Like it or not, Latin is something you must contend with!

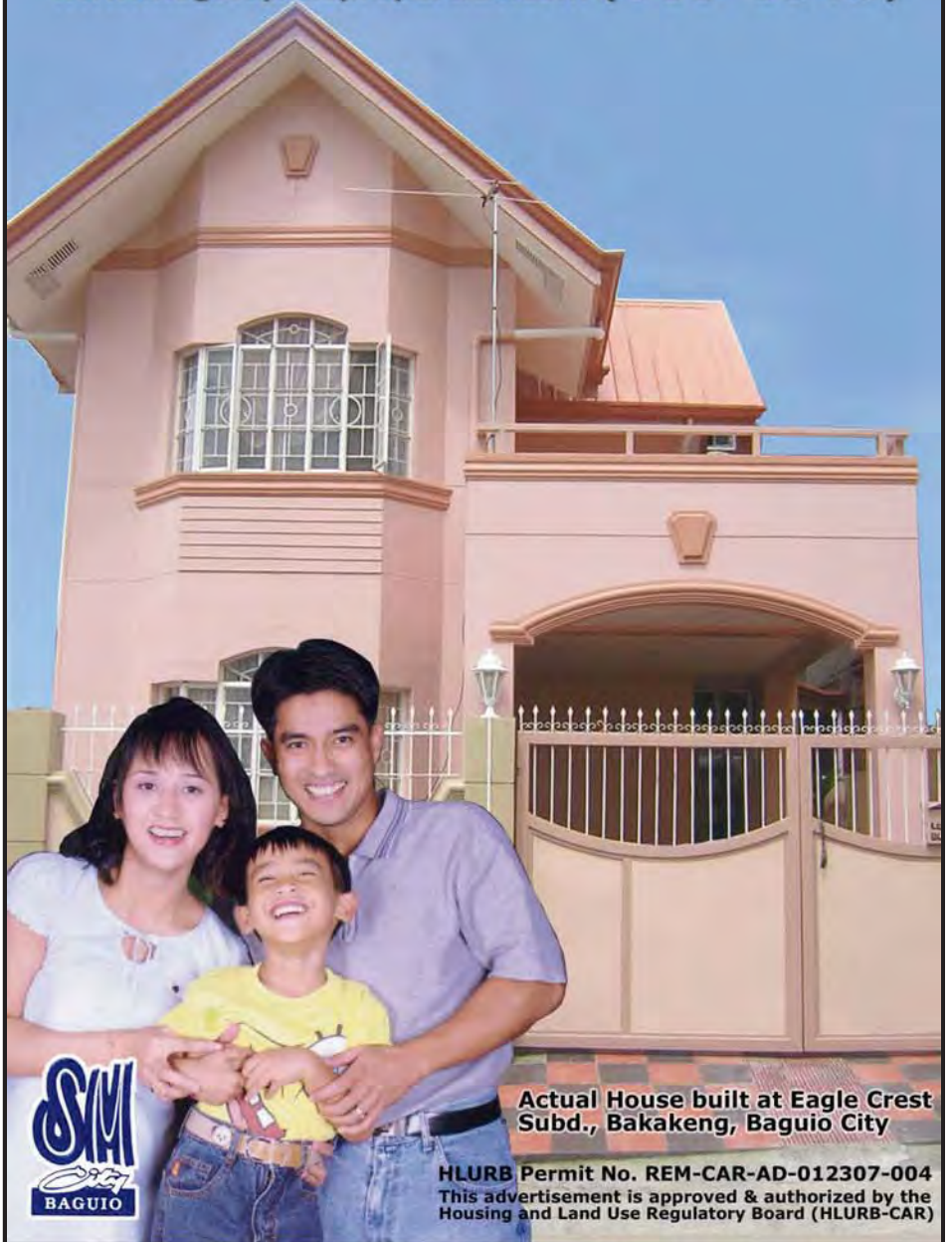
