What can I say about this special gentleman? As the first recruit during my term as your RCB president, he was sworn-in as the first new member on our very first meeting during RY 2007-08. This somehow made him the emblematic icon for membership recruitment during that fateful year, even if that specific status somehow got clouded with issues from within our ranks.

If grieve you must.*

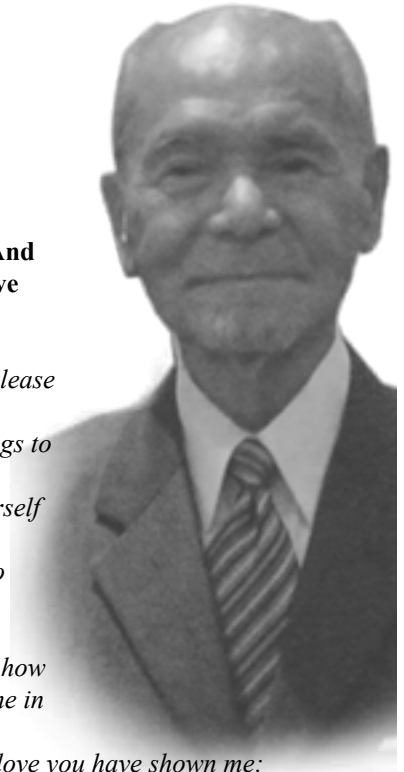
*Then let your grief be comforted by trust.

RCB's Scholar Message 05 September 09

Too often, we, the youth- ages between thirteen to thirty-five years old, are viewed with the conventional eyes of our elders: that we are the future of the nation; we are the catalyst of change. The government counts on us to help save the country and some civil society says that this will be achieved by being vigilant. For the most part, however, we fail.

Early this year, disturbing figures came from drug enforcement agencies. There are nine million drug addicts in the country. Ninety percent of this number is between the ages 16 years old and 30. Another report which came from an intelligence unit of the government presented that the usual profile of Filipino drug users are those belonging to the 14 to 25 age group. Imagine, many teenagers buy and sell illegal drugs just like they load their cellphones. There are also 2.75 million young smokers while 4.7 million are young drinkers. Also, added to these failures is the sexual freedom that is oftentimes abused resulting to pornography and many other deviant sexual acts. For all their worldliness, many young people are seemingly not clear about where they want to go in life or bright future they should aspire for.

On one hand, however, there are 1.6 illiterate children in the country. Many of them with ages ten years old are street children, child laborers, and victims of natural disasters and the never-ending armed conflicts. Children 13-18 years old are found to be susceptible victims of sexual abuse which accounts for half of the reported cases throughout the regions, followed immediately by children 7-12 years old. There are also 3.7 million working children with 70% engaged in fishing, agriculture and forestry; 24% work in services and sales and 5% work in industries. Surprisingly, this statistics were from the 1995 NSO reports. Fourteen years have already passed and these situations regarding the youth are still prevalent and becoming worse.

Why is the youth seems to be misdirected? Is it because of the church? The parents? Government? Or does this societal mess boil down to the wrong doings of the youth? Whatever your answers are, what is perfectly clear is that the youth is being victimized.

How can we be the future of this nation if the government itself, does not support us? Education. The constitution says that education is a right of every child. But what is happening at present is education has already become a privilege. For instance in 2006, I only paid not more than five thousand pesos during enrolments when I was in first year. In 2007, all incoming freshman students have to pay at least ten thousand pesos for their

first semester only for them to be accommodated in U.P. That amount already accounts to my whole 1 year stay in the university. Since there was a commercialization of education by implementing high increase of tuition and other fees, many poor but deserving fourth year high school students, although they passed the university's entrance examination, opt to look for a school with cheaper amount of tuition. Thus, their education along with their future is compromised. Instead of U.P being the University of the People, it turned out that now, it has become the University for the Privileged. Those who can only pay for the high tuition are given opportunity to study in one of the most prestigious schools in the country and will have to experience quality education. Good thing there is still no sign in the entrance gate that says No money, no entry. Well, that would be ill.

Not enough classrooms to accomodate students, outdated textbooks and references, increase of in tuition and other fees, obsolete school facilities and equipment, school teachers leaving the country to look for greener pasture. These and many others are the common problems regarding education in most parts of our country. Alarming as these may seem, instead of allocating more budget for education, President Arroyo is more concerned with other things like what to eat for dinner. How I wish I could also experience a one million peso worth dinner like what she did.

Moving on, how can we be the catalyst of change if our elders do not teach us that? I am thankful of the remittances of our Overseas Filipino Workers. The government even hailed our OFWs as the new-called heroes because by working abroad, their remittances in the country help the economy. That is of course the positive side. However, the youth is experiencing the negative effects of parents who are too busy working out of the country especially during their child's growing years, usually from ages between 0-6 years old. Definitely, the salary they receive abroad for instance, being domestic helpers, is definitely much higher compared to a salary of a public school teacher here. For the past years, parents see this opportunity of working overseas to give their children better future. Yet, their leaving their kids means their kids' high risk of being exposed also to different elements. Meeting new cliques may lead them to the use of drugs, smoking, alcohol, drinking and pornography. This will not happen if they have been guided responsibly by their parents in their growing years. Responsible parenthood does not only mean providing their needs by sending their children monthly allowance or by rewarding them extra money to buy their wants in life like trendy clothes, gadgets, and

the like. Being a responsible parent is more of being with the children as role models. It is the parents who first instil good values and morals to their children. It is the responsibility of the parents to show love and support to their kids. Parents also serve to be the companion of their kids during the happiest moments in their lives and also the first persons who will constantly remind that everything's okay in times of their kid's failures. If parents failed to fulfil their duties to their kids, more often than not, the youth will be a reflection of such irresponsible parenting. I do not say however that parents should just stay home and be with their kids like forever. It is good if one of the parents stays at home while the other is earning enough from a job that can meet their family's daily needs. But if both of the parents are at home enjoying tong-its or, mah-jong, then it becomes another problem that usually happens in families in the lower social class. Most of the cases, these parents teach their kids at early stage, that there is no hope in life. That their kids cannot go to school unlike other children of well-off parents, because they do not have money to give them allowance or cannot even buy them even notebooks. Instead, they just teach their kids to work like begging in the streets or exposing them to other forms of child labor.

With all these interrelated problems that affect the youth, do the words of our national hero, Dr. Jose Rizal that "ang kabataan ang pag-asa ng bayan" still resonate? As a part of the large number of youth, my answer will be DEFINITELY YES. I believe that only if we, the youth are guided responsibly and be provided with opportunities to cope up with all our frustrations, aspirations and challenges we have at present, then we can be honed to be the future of this generation. "Taglay ng mga kabataang gaya ko ang kasiglahan ng pag-iisip at pangangatawan. Bukas ang aming isip sa pagbabago ng ganitong lumalalang sitwasyon." We are the future of this nation and we are capable of creating change also for the good of our own future and the future of all generations next to us. With this, I am thankful for all the elders that have high regards and concern for us youth; those who think that without us, no one will continue what they have started. Rizal, himself, is one of the many examples. At an early age of 29, he died because he fought for the country. I do not say that the youth must also exemplify what he did and not to the extent of dying to be considered a hero. Though I do not also say that the youth needs to be like Manny Pacquiao or Charisse Pempenco. I know that there are lots of other opportunities for us in the future. Personally, I would like to thank this club, the Rotary Club Of Baguio because through your help, I am rewarded. I have been your scholar since first year college and now, I am hoping to graduate next semester. More than the financial help you're giving me, being your scholar humbles me. It inspires me to keep striving to attain academic excellence. This club, like my sorority that I hope you're not taking it against me, has taught me how important it is to become nationalistic. Being your scholar indeed also taught me to always see and share goodness in everybody. That the purpose of being a concerned individual is giving service to people above myself. But most importantly, the general realization this club has taught me is that being a scholar is more than just a privilege. It is also a responsibility. To be humble, to be kind, to be a responsible student and responsible citizen of the country are characteristics I can use in achieving my goals in life.

Through this club and other organizations that offer great help for the youth in achieving great future, the shortcomings of some parents, the government, and the country as a whole, will be well-addressed if not, will be given the basic solutions. You, our elders, please help us youth to think that in spite of all these societal mess, there is still hope to see goodness in everything, through YOU.

"Ang kabataan ang pag-asa ng bayan." This statement is nothing but a cliché to most, but for me, this holds true and your Rotary scholars are some of the living witnesses.
